New Computers for All Patrons

Thanks to a grant from former Hyde Parker Holly McGrath through the Richard and Susan Smith Foundation, all adult, young adult, and children's computers have been replaced at the Hyde Park Branch Library.

The grant also provided one additional computer each in the children's and YA rooms. And the grant funds two instructors who will provide training for adult patrons (children and teens are generally pretty savvy with computer technology!). The part time instructors, one from Jewish Volunteer Services, the other a BPL staffer who is fluent in Creole, will begin in early spring.

Movies and More for Adults

Co-sponsored by the Friends of the HP Branch Library, Liz Smith, adult librarian announces a new afternoon movie series. The movies are screened at 2:30 each Friday in Menino Hall.

Launched in January with the 5 blockbuster nominees from 1958, the series continues in February with 4 romantic favorites. In March, the series will feature Irish classics in honor of St. Patrick's Day, while April's films will be musicals.

For its February selection, the new adult book discussion group, which meets on the 4th Monday of each month at 6:30 p.m., will join The Big Read, a national initiative by the National Endowment for the Arts. This year's title is *Their Eyes Were Watching God* by Zora Neale Hurston.

The book discussion at Hyde Park is on February 23, and on the following Saturday at 2:30 in Menino Hall the movie version will be presented. All are welcome to attend.

Founders' Day Bookmark Ball

Save the Date: Saturday, April 4, 8-11

In recognition of the library's important role in the Hyde Park community, the fourth annual winter party will now be known as the Founders' Day Bookmark Ball.

Hyde Park was developed as a town by the Twenty Associates organized by Alpheus Perley Blake in 1868 (it was the last of the independent towns to be annexed by Boston in 1912). The first public library opened in Everett Square just 5 years after the town's founding, and it moved into its present location in 1899.

Central to this year's event are two important members of the Boston Public Library system. Amy Ryan, the new president of the Boston system, will serve as honorary chair and is looking forward to meeting the attendees. The honored guest this year is Barbara Wicker, the Branch Librarian for over 30 years, who is retiring on February 27.

The Founders' Day Bookmark Ball will feature live music (dancing optional!), a cash bar with wine and beer, and a variety of tasty hors d'oeuvres and sweets in the library.

FAREWELL TO BARBARA

"It is a pleasure every day I walk in," she said, speaking of the award winning building expanded during her tenure, and of the people who work in or patronize the Hyde Park Branch.

But after three weeks in Cambodia, Laos, Vietnam, and Thailand, Barbara Wicker will return for her final two weeks as the Branch Librarian from February 14-27, ending a 40 year career in the Boston Public Library System.

Born in Cincinnati, Barbara grew up in Cleveland, earned a BA with a double major in French and Library Science at Syracuse University, then completed her Masters in Library Science program at Case Western University.

"I wanted to move east – Boston, New York City, or Washington. The BPL was hiring, so I never got beyond my first stop!"

She began her career in August of 1968 as the young adult librarian at the Roslindale Branch where she worked with Virginia Lyons, then a pre-professional children's librarian, and later, of course, long-time adult librarian at the Hyde Park Branch.

After a year, she was transferred to the South Boston Branch, and the following summer, just before a trip to London, she was told she was being moved again, this time to Hyde Park.

"I loved the teens I was working with in Southie, Barbara said, "and there I was in central London constantly seeing signs for "Hyde Park" reminding me of the move I didn't feel ready to make!"

Regrets did not linger for long as Barbara served first as young adult librarian, then as acting Branch Librarian, before achieving her final position as Hyde Park Branch Librarian around the time of her marriage to John Wicker in 1978.

Barbara has relished many activities and accomplishments during her career. She is proud of the library's partnership with the Hyde Park Arts Initiative. "It has been a personal and professional dream come true, the coming together of various organizations in the community." She has also been instrumental in helping to launch the Business Membership drive with the Friends this winter.

But for the career highlight, "of course, it would have to be the building of the addition. It was amazing to work with so many outstanding people, each of whom was essential to the success of the project: the people of Hyde Park, the Friends, the architects, the liaisons from the city."

Doubling the size of the library was not the only change during Barbara's career. "The profession was different when I started. My generation bridged the shift from an emphasis on print materials to the more heavily computer-oriented information services. However, literacy has never been more important than it is now, and a professional staff is essential to assist the public in accessing these services."

As a new financial crisis looms over all city services, Barbara muse about a previous one in 1981. "That was when the Friends of the Hyde Park Library group was established. The city was actually planning to close all the branches, and the Friends were instrumental in exerting great pressure to keep them open."

Although she will be leaving her position on February 27, she will not be abandoning an active life. She will return from her beloved Florida retreat for the Founders' Day Bookmark Ball on April 4, and embark on volunteer activities she has already lined up: shelving picture books at the Pierce School in Brookline, answering phones at the Newton Historical Society, and finishing the set-up up and organization of the local history room at the HP Library. She looks forward to being an active member of the HP Historical Society.

"And of course, I will continue to be relentless in my pursuit of an original Enneking painting!"
